ANNUAL PARISH MEETING OF DALE ABBEY

Minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting of Dale Abbey held on Thursday 16th May 2024 at The Gateway 7pm.

Apologies	Apologies were received from Cllr Smith, CCllr Hart, BCllr Mee and BCllr Flatley.
Approval of the Minutes	It was RESOLVED to approve the minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting on Thursday 18 th May 2023.
Chairman's Report	First of all I would like to thanks members of the council for giving me the opportunity to be Chairman of the parish council. Special thanks also to Faye, our parish Clerk who has worked extremely hard throughout the year to give myself and the other councillors guidance around some contentious issues. Faye always seems to find the right person to ring and manages to get me some awkward answers to some awkward questions. As a council during my term as Chairman, we have faced some difficult issues. Which have led to difficult decisions to be made. Top of this list would be the loss in this financial year, of a substantial amount of income when Erewash Borough Council decided to remove the amount, we received via concurrent functions from £8612 to £2000 a loss to us of £6612. We understand that we may be losing the remaining £2000 in the next financial year. Along with other parish councils we objected on the grounds that the parish residents were being double taxed and that there had been no meaningful negotiations on the subject. Objections were to no avail; Dale Abbey Councillors took this information on board and after hours and hours of proper debate and decision making managed to reach a conclusion based on hard fact and simple maths that we had to increase the parish precept by a significant amount in order to carry out our duties and obligations. Coupled with this the council has scrutinised existing contracts and arrangements to make sure that things are being done in a proper manner. Due to this diligence I can report that we are in a strong financial position going forward. On a lighter note I can report the parish council has

		been able to provide residents with some tangible benefits for example, the speed indicator device with funding from the Police and Crime Commissioner is installed and operational, cameras with the purpose of catching fly-tippers are being installed and monitored, once again purchased with the help of the Police and Crime Commissioner funding. Can I just give special thanks to a resident for his continuing help and expertise surrounding the installation of these cameras. Two planters yet to be installed were purchased with funding via the King's Coronation, the same funding also provided the forum with a fish and chip supper and a children's party. I must say that all of these grants were sourced by Faye, our Clerk, so many thanks to Faye. The Christmas light switch on was a successful and enjoyable evening for everyone. The mulled wine, mince pies and entertainment seemed to go down very well, so a huge thanks to council members for their work during the year and to our county and borough councillors for their attendance at our meetings and to the residents for their support, that concludes my report thanks for listening.

23-24/5	Local Community Group Reports	The secretary of Stanton by Dale Cricket club presented to the meeting, outlining the historical status of the club, having been established in 1868 and how much of an asset it is to both parishes. The club attracts all ages, with currently 120 members, an increase of approximately 50% in the last couple of years. There are two league teams who complete every Saturday, and a Sunday friendly team. The club now has an established women's team and three junior teams and mentions an annual tour to the Cotswolds which has been running for many years now. The secretary encouraged everyone to visit the club, whether it was to get involved with playing, helping around the ground or socially, everyone will be made very welcome. At the Annual Meeting for Stanton by Dale a resident asked about walking cricket and the secretary can now confirm that there is offering within derby, meeting at local sports centres, but Stanton by Dale would like to pursue holding and event for walking cricket and the club and will liaise with the community on this. The Club has recently undergone a complete refurbishment, which was largely self-funded, the club facilities are very welcoming and includes a bar. The club has its own website and is present on social media, the Clerk will share information on the Parish Council's website, noticeboards, and social media platforms. The churchwarden from All Saints Dale Abbey attended the meeting to share information about our local churches. First, apologies from Phil Selby the rector who would have loved to be here but is busy with Youth Work, so sadly you have me instead. For those who don't know me, I'm Dave Cousins,

and I have the great privilege and responsibility of being churchwarden at All Saints Dale Abbey, just
around the corner.
All Saints is one third of "SDR Churches" which is a rather catchy name for the benefice of St Michael and
All Angels Stanton by Dale, All Saints Dale Abbey and All Saints Risley. We like to think of ourselves "one
church in three locations". Phil has been rector for coming up to 5 years and is supported by our curate
James Lee, and a team of volunteers who carry out a wide range of roles and duties. The stated mission of
SDR Churches is "For the glory of God, we seek to know Jesus and to make Him known".
So what do we do and why, and how? You will be aware of our Sunday Services, throughout the
Benefice, but you may be surprised at how much else goes on, within such a small church numerically.
As it happens, just last week, we had our annual APCM or Annual Parochial Church Meeting, which is
similar in nature to this meeting, bringing together and reporting on the activities, achievements and
plans of all the groups within the benefice - all neatly reported in this little booklet. I have spare copies
and you are welcome to take one and read through. So, what does our commitment to Christ mean in
practical terms? REACH OUT We aim to reach out to all ages; all 'stages' (that is people who already
profess to be Christians; whether lifelong or recent; those we may term 'seekers'; those with little or no
faith; AND those who consider the Bible and the whole Church thing to be irrelevant, outdated or just
plain nonsense). We do understand that viewpoint: after all, most of us were there at some point. ALL
are welcome at our events and services. The term 'Outreach' actually covers a lot of things. The existence
and availability of this building, the Gateway, is part of that outreach structure.
Our passion for youth and children's work means that we offer a wide range of groups and activities,
aimed at all age groups. From having a creche in Stanton and Risley church during services, to the Jam
club (Jesus and Me) Sunday School groups that meet 3 weeks out of 4, to other groups during the week.
We run See and Know for Parents and Toddlers on Tuesday mornings, Heroes for 7 to 11 year olds,
Impact for 12 to 14 and Ignite for our 15s and above, on various evenings. Dads and Kids meets once a
month in Stanton, involving fun activities and usually bacon sandwiches! Our youth workers also take
children on summer camps, exhausting but great fun for all. Our links with Risley School mean that we run
Quest Clubs for both Infants and Junior at Easter and Christmas, and Phil and James take collective
worship. But it's not just children that we try to connect with. We have a caring and committed Pastoral
Care team to come alongside and support those struggling for whatever reason. Some of that team have
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developed strong links with Woodhall Park nursing home in Risley. We also run seeker friendly courses,
like Discover, and Hope Explored which gives everyone the chance to ask those difficult questions about
Christianity and Faith. It gives a chance to find out more. We also have prayer breakfasts, and special
events, like wreath making, candle painting and, of course, we have Tea and Company, once a month,
both in Stanton by Dale and here in the Gateway. Excellent cakes and great opportunities to chat and
share village life. In all these areas we are fully committed to high standards of Safeguarding, in line with
C of E's most recent protocols, ensuring leaders and helpers have completed the relevant training.
DISCIPLESHIP This refers primarily to more established members of the church - learning to be more like
Jesus is a lifelong task. Brilliant though our Sunday sermons are, there is always more to build on and
explore. All three villages host home groups and bible study groups at different times of the week. It's a
way of connecting deeply with each other and the God we serve.
Once a month we come together for our Benefice prayer meeting.
SEND OUT We have been fortunate for three years to have the services of our curate James Lee who has
contributed enormously to this benefice. Inevitably however it will soon be time for him to move on to a
parish of his own. Sad for us, but this is all part of Sending Out.
As part of this sending out, several ex-members of our Youth Groups have gone on to pastoral roles at
universities and beyond.
SDR Churches also supports, financially and through prayer, five Mission Partners, charities that do
brilliant work in a range of contexts: Canaan Trust working with homeless in Long Eaton, providing safe
accommodation for victims. You may be aware of their current appeal for establishing a safe house for
abused women. Compassion UK supporting individuals and their communities in developing countries,
ensuring education and health care; Middle East Media which uses media and technology to reach out
into oppressed regions, in support of personal freedom and particularly supporting women Crosslinks
which supports missionary workers in various countries, and Open Doors which operates in countries
where religious persecution is most severe. Information about each of these partners is on the posters at
the side. So much for the overview of what the church does. What about here, in Dale Abbey?
As churchwarden I am responsible to the rector for practical aspects of the physical church building (inc
churchyards) and the smooth running of the services (thanks to our very supportive congregation) and
some financial responsibility. We have a service in church at 9a.m. on second and third Sundays, the

fourth being here in the Gateway. At the moment there is not service in Dale Abbey on the first Sunday of
the month. Instead, we join with our sister congregations either at Stanton or Risley. All details appear in
the weekly news sheets, available from the leaflet boxes outside this building and at the foot of the
church walk, particularly important around Christmas and Easter time and other significant occasions,
such as Remembrance and Mothering Sunday. All Saints Dale Abbey as you know is historically and
architecturally unique. I feel very privileged to be Warden but there is a lot to do and be accountable for!
The church is open to visitors on Sundays and Bank Holidays throughout the summer; please do invite
family and friends to visit. Our visitor's book is full of encouraging messages. Guide leaflets are freely
provided. Also, by prior arrangement (and with thanks to Ruth and Roger Allen) we can arrange guided
tours of both the church and the Abbey. Thankfully over the years significant grant funding for major
works has kept the church intact and safe. The bell has fallen silent as it is in need of significant
realignment. But as you can appreciate, ongoing maintenance of ancient buildings is never cheap. The
PCC has a duty of using the church's finances wisely. The successful sale of Hermits Wood has boosted
funds for the parish of Stanton by Dale with Dale Abbey. We are very pleased that this was completed
and are confident that the wood is in safe hands for the future. One small saving that we can make
concerns maintenance of the churchyards, both the 'active' one along Moor Lane and the closed one at
the church. The Parish Council has kindly mown and maintained both in recent years. This year that
arrangement has changed, and we understand the reasons, so we need to be a little creative in
minimising the extra cost to the church. For the closed churchyard, next to the church, a plan for partial
re-wilding and improved biodiversity is being developed, based on advice from the Derbyshire Wildlife
Trust. Consequently (see poster) we will be mowing some areas of the churchyard less, so that:
Wildflowers can grow; to encourage pollinators; to save fuel and reduce CO2 emissions; and to encourage
biodiversity.
, The churchyard will look different but be assured it will not be simply neglected. Indeed we are confident
that it will be much enhanced by being managed this way. Anyone, connected with the church or not,
would be most welcome to join the volunteers group, currently Tim Summers, Paul James and myself,
and we plan to engage with the local community more widely in this project with occasional active
participation and events.
We all recognise the churchyard as very much an important part of the visual impact of this beautiful
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village.
This is a new initiative and you, the Parish Council, are first to know about it. We have drafted some
signage and intend to publicise it on Village Chat, and to summon up support.
The Gateway
This building is a huge blessing both to the church and to this village. I speak now, not just from the
church 'side' but as a resident of 40 years I value this building as much as anyone. However it is,
financially, also a very big challenge. Its income nowhere near covers its running costs, and clearly half a
dozen social events a year are not enough to sustain it. With this in mind the church welcomed the
formation of Friends of the Gateway to manage the building and with the aim of significantly increasing
its income. I will say no more on this topic as it neatly hands over to Annette who can tell you about FOG
and its progress and plans to ensure that this building can continue to be an asset for everyone.
To summarise
The church is here for everyone. Wherever you are on your spiritual journey, we are here for youand
there are numerous events and groups that you can come along to and find out more. Whether to join us
at a service, or to one of the occasional courses, or just to come to Tea and Company and have a chat and
some lovely cakes, we'd be delighted to welcome you. Or, just ask.
I remind you that all the church activities and contact information are on the
website sdrchurches.org and there is a stack of these APCM booklets that fill in more information than I
have been able to give you today. Weekly update leaflets are always available by the gates at the church
and outside here, and also electronically for anyone who wants to receive them.
Please do ask any questions.
Report from Chairman of Dale Abbey Village Forum, The Chairman wished to thank the Parish Council for
previously covering the full maintenance costs of the defibrillator, it is a reassuring presence. Training
sessions on how to operate the defibrillator will be considered again in the near future.
Report from The Friends of The Gateway, a representative of The Gateway reported that they have now
been operating for 10 months, during this time they have obtained grants and donations to cover the
repairs of the roof, which is about to start imminently, and further grants and donations are being
gathered to upgrade the toilet facilities, the interior will need some work too. Going forward the aim is to

		attract more hall users/hires, also focusing on working in the garden, creating a garden of refection and
		selling produce.
		The Chairman of the Parish Council extended his thanks to all the groups who reported, it was really great
		to welcome them to the Annual Meeting of the Parish.

	Councillor Reports	I am not sure where to begin, I think after the trauma of dealing with Covid-19 I think I felt that this last year would be one of moving forward in a positive way but unfortunately due to various circumstances it has proved nothing of the sort.
		 In no particular order some of the problems have been weather, cost of living, wage rises and war in Ukraine, all of these things have meant we have been fire fighting for the vast majority of the year. There has been a massive impact on our budget and although there have been some extra grants from Government our main Council funding has and is stretched to its limit. Firstly the weather, I think nobody can deny that these last few months have been some of the worst in our history, incessant rain, frost, snow, storms, especially Storm Babet, it has been a nightmare time for our Highways Department, potholes appearing everywhere and with 3,500 miles of roads in Derbyshire we have had around 25 crews working 24/7 to try and address the massive problems but the weather has also meant that sometimes only temporary measure could be taken, we have been looking at new equipment to help and we have doubled the investment in Highways over the last 4 years but still chasing our tail but hopefully our frequent messages from our Cabinet Member for Highways has kept everyone up to date. The cost of living problem along with larger than expected wage rises, cost of adult care and children's services has meant that we have had to take measures to enable us to produce a balanced budget, this has included a temporary freeze on non-essential employment, looking at selling off surplus properties, this because since Covid there is more hybrid working and working from home meaning that many properties are no longer being used to capacity. We are also looking at selling a major part of County Hall, our headquarters, and building a new modern up to date facility in the car park, more efficient and would enable savings without compromising our 'home' in Matlock, County Hall started out as a wonderful Spa retreat and there is much interest from various parties to bringing this wonderful, but expensive to maintain building back to its former glory. Children's Services:- This service is facing rising

23-24/7	Finance Report	It is pleasing to report that after a robust budget setting process and reviewing of contracts and we are starting the new financial year in a good position with £21817, some of which we will be required to ringfence as reserves, each spend is recorded separately and attached to the end of each minutes, towards the end of June more financial information will be added to our website to support our transparent approach.
		for children is fostering, we could always do with more foster parents coming forward and we know from feedback how rewording being foster parents can be. Adult Care:- Again another department under pressure, we are all living longer, which is great news, but it does need more people need extra care particularly to stay in their own homes which is what the vast majority of people wish to do but massive pressures on employing or retaining home care staff Public Health:- This is the major part of my portfolio and it is all about working to improve the health of our residents in Derbyshire, since Covid we are certainly working in a much better way with the NHS and our work is all about prevention. We have just received a large Government grant to help the campaign to stop smoking, one of the biggest causes of death with around 76K dying in the UK each year and many living with the rehabilitating affects of smoking. I could go on but this is just a flavour of some of our current problems, and with around a £32M funding gap, it has meant that, as you will have seen, we have asked for the maximum council tax, 4.99% but we are working hard to make savings but at the same time not to let our standards slip and one of our projects at the moment is to update our IT which will mean much better communication, I know very often there is frustration of how you are kept informed or your queries answered, hopefully you will see an improvement when this project is finalised. Going forward as I am sure you will have seen we are now moving to become a Combined Authority with mayoral elections on 2 nd May, it is hoped and expected that the Combined Authority will bring more money into the region, we have always been underfunded compared with other areas in the country, and this will address priorities such as transport, particularly connectivity, education, skills and health, I will do my best to keep you informed on this as we move forward. As I always say I vill always do my best to help the Parish Council in any way I can and
